After receipt of this form, additional information will be sent to those who expect to attend the meetings. Included will be a map of the campus, information about facilities available, such as eating places, parking lots, baby sitting service, etc.

LODGING

Space has been reserved in the Short Course Dormitories on campus for persons attending the SAA and CSAS meetings. These dormitories will accommodate up to 225 persons when occupied to capacity. Each room has a wash basin. Toilets and showers are apart. Separate toilet and shower facilities for men and women are provided. Charges are \$1.50 per person per day when 3 occupy a room, \$2.00 per person when 2 occupy a room, and \$3.00 when one person occupies a room. Since accommodations are limited, rooms will be assigned in the order in which reservation forms are received.
